## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder knows how to support children to make progress in their learning. She understands how children learn and how to use observations and assessments to identify and provide for their individual needs.
- The childminder knows how to provide a secure and welcoming environment, to support children's emotional well-being and help children learn to respect each other and behave positively, to help promote their emotional well-being.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents and other settings involved with children, in order to provide a shared approach to children's learning and development.
- The childminder demonstrates a clear understanding of how children's good health is promoted. For example, she is aware of the need to promote physical exercise, and healthy food and good hygiene.
- The childminder has a clear understanding of how to safeguard children and child protection procedures. She knows what to do if she has concerns about a children's welfare in her care and the procedures to follow.
- The childminder demonstrates a commitment to continuous improvement through self-evaluation and attending relevant training updating her knowledge.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector sampled a range of documents and discussed the childminder's policies, which the childminder uses when caring for children with her.
- The inspector viewed the areas of the premises that are available for children's to use.
- The inspector discussed with the childminder how she intends to promote children's learning and development.
- The inspector discussed self-evaluation with the childminder and viewed her written information.
