## Summary of key findings for parents

### The provision meets requirements

- The childminder understands the importance of reflecting on her practice to identify priorities for improvement and training needs, which she proactively targets.
- The childminder understands the importance of teaching children how to keep themselves safe. She is knowledgeable about the procedures to follow if she is concerned about any aspect relating to children's safety and welfare.
- The childminder is knowledgeable about the early learning goals and experienced in assessing, tracking and planning for children's progress.
- The childminder understands the importance of working in partnership with parents and others involved with children to ensure children receive consistent support.
- The childminder understands the benefits of promoting healthy lifestyles, such as eating healthily, being outdoors and taking part in physical activity.
- The childminder has a wide range of play and learning resources and equipment available that is suitable for children of varying ages.

There were no children present when this inspection took place. The findings in this report are based on evidence gathered from discussions with those who care for the children and an inspection of the premises, equipment and relevant documentation. Where there are no children present, no judgement is made on the quality of the early years provision as there is no reliable evidence on which to assess its impact on children. The report states whether the provider continues to meet the requirements of registration.

## Inspection activities

- The inspector spoke to the childminder about how she supports children's learning and development. The inspector checked that the childminder is meeting the safeguarding and welfare requirements.
- The inspector looked at relevant documentation, including that relating to safeguarding practices and the childminder's suitability to work with children.
- The inspector checked the suitability of the premises, furniture and equipment and assessed the childminder's understanding of providing appropriate resources for children's different stages of development.
